

# 'Too' and 'Enough'

12 year olds

## Description

'Too' and 'enough' are adverbs that tell us about an amount of something. They can give us more information about an adjective, adverb or a noun.

## Objectives

To help you understand the differences between useful quantifying determiners.

## Language

Too - negative - there is more of something than necessary.

Enough - positive - the amount of something is sufficient.

Not enough - negative - there is less than the necessary amount of something.

### Too + adjective/adverb

It's too cold to go to the park today.

Slow down, you're walking too quickly!

We don't use 'too' to describe a positive quantity. Instead use 'really' 'very' or 'so'

(X) The concert was 'too good' -- The concert was really good.

(X) Your dress is too beautiful! -- Your dress is so beautiful.

In some cases, it's possible to use the double negative 'not too' in a colloquial manner.

E.g. Not too cold/Not too difficult/Not too bad

### adjective/adverb + enough

She's good enough to win the competition.

### not + adjective/adverb + enough

I'm not tall enough to ride the rollercoaster.

### too + much/many + noun

Use 'many' for countable nouns and 'much' for uncountable.

There are too many people here.

The teacher gave us too much homework.

### enough + noun

I had enough time to watch a film this evening.

negative we add 'not' – usually before the main verb.

I didn't have enough time to watch a film.

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## ✂️ Materials

- Fake money / coins
- Pictures of items with a secret price
- Worksheets
- Pencils

## 💡 Procedure

- 10mins** **Introduction:** Introduce 'too' and 'enough' by reviewing the grammar rules and watching the supplementary video.
- 10mins** **Activity:** The price is right - Prep this activity by printing out the 'Items' worksheet and determining a 'hidden' price for each item. Tell students they are going shopping, but they must 'bid' on the items. Give students an equal amount of fake money, and let them place bids. After the bids are placed, reveal the true amount. The student with the closest bet 'buys' them item. After all items have been sold, have each student write a few sentences about their shopping experience, indicating which items they had enough money for, and which items were too expensive. E.g. The item was too expensive/ I had enough money I didn't have enough money/I bid too much money, etc.
- 10mins** **Worksheet:** Complete the sentences for reinforcement.

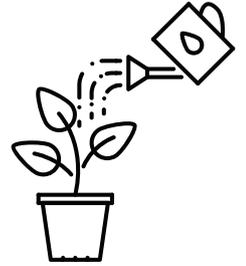
